

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ONESIE

This tutorial is for a baby onesie! It only uses one t-shirt. This onesie has no legs, it has a drawstring closure, and it uses the pre-existing collar of the t-shirt. The size of the onesie depends on the size of the t-shirt, so pick accordingly!

CUT PATTERN



1. Cut the pattern. Pin it, since it's two layers of t-shirt. Notice you will be using the pre-existing collar of the t-shirt.

CUT KEYHOLE

2. On the back, cut a slit starting at the center of the collar, about 2 inches, or 5 cm, long. This is called a keyhole.

3. Turn the onesie inside out, pretty sides facing each other, to sew it.

PIN & MARK

4. Mark between a quarter of an inch to a half an inch, or 0.6-1.3 cm, of seam allowance on the bottom and the sides. Pin.

SEW ONESIE

5. Sew the bottom and the sides, starting right under the armpits.

6. Remember to reverse.

7. Turn the onesie inside out.

MAKE CLOSURE

8. Cut two small strings and attach them to the keyhole, so you can tie a bow in the back. You will sew the strings onto the keyhole at the edge.

9. That's the onesie!

INSTRUCTIONS FOR ONESIE WITH LEGS

This tutorial is for a baby onesie! It only uses one t-shirt. This onesie is with legs, so it's a full body onesie! The size of the onesie depends on the size of the t-shirt, so pick accordingly!

CUT PATTERN



1. Place the pattern on the t-shirt and cut. Pin it, since it's two layers of t-shirt. Notice you will be using the pre-existing collar of the t-shirt.
2. On the back, cut a slit starting at the center of the collar, about 2 inches, or 5 cm, long. This is called a keyhole.

SEW ONESIE

3. Turn the onesie inside out, pretty sides facing each other, to sew it.
4. Mark between a quarter of an inch to a half an inch, or 0.6-1.3 cm, of seam allowance on the bottom and the sides. Pin.
5. Cut little slits on the bottom, since it's a curve.

CREATE DRAWSTRING

6. Create a small drawstring, long enough to tie it around the baby's neck.
7. Send it through the collar of the t-shirt. It's done!
